A BILL

To prohibit night baking; to amend the Bread Act, 1901, and certain other Acts; to repeal the Bread (Amendment) Act, 1923; and for purposes connected therewith.

BE it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. This Act may be cited as the "Bread Amendment Short title. (Night Baking) Act, 1925."

Bread Amendment (Night Baking).

2. The Bread Act, 1901, as amended by subsequent Acts, is amended by inserting the following section which shall be read as section ten of the said Act—

Amendment of Act No. 35, 1901.
New section 10.

10. (1) No person exercising or employed in the trade or calling of a baker shall at any time between the hours of eight o'clock in the evening and six o'clock in the morning of the following day, make or bake any bread, rolls or cakes of any sort or kind.

Prohibition of night baking.

(2) Any person who commits a breach of the provisions of subsection one of this section shall be liable upon summary conviction to a penalty of not less than *twenty* shillings, and not exceeding *three* pounds.

(3) An inspector appointed under the Early Closing Act, 1899, on producing the certificate of his appointment, may enter at any reasonable hour any premises in which the trade or calling of a baker is carried on and make such inquiries as he thinks necessary to ascertain if the provisions of this section have been complied with. If any person wilfully obstructs such inspector in the exercise by him of the said powers or fails to truly answer any such inquiries made by such inspector he shall be liable upon summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding *ten* pounds.

3. The Bread (Amendment) Act, 1923, is repealed.
