# A BILL

For facilitating sales, leases, and other dispositions of settled land, and for promoting the execution of improvements thereon.

BE it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of New South Wales in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

# Preliminary.

1. This Act may be cited as the "Settled Land Act, Short title.

# Repeal.

**3.** (1) The Acts mentioned in the Schedule to this Repeal of Act, to the extent to which the same are there expressed Acts. to be repealed, are hereby repealed.

(2) All rules of court made under the authority of any Act hereby repealed and being in force at the commencement of this Act shall, so far as applicable, be deemed to have been made under the authority of this Act.

### PART I.

## DEFINITIONS AND INTERPRETATION.

4. In this Act, unless the context or subject-matter Interpretaotherwise indicates or requires—

"Administrator" means administrator within the See 45 & 46 Wic., c. 38, meaning of the Wills, Probate and Adminis- s. 2 (10). tration Act, 1898, and includes the Public Trustee acting as collector under an order to collect.

"Building purposes" includes the erecting and the improving of, and the adding to and the repairing of, buildings; and a building lease is a lease for any building purposes or purposes connected therewith.

"Court" means the Supreme Court in its equitable iurisdiction.

"Executor" means the executor to whom probate has been granted, and includes an executor by right of representation.

"Income" includes rent and profits; and "posses-

sion" includes receipt of income.
"Land" includes tenements and hereditaments, corporeal and incorporeal, and every estate and interest therein, whether vested or contingent, freehold or leasehold, and whether at law or in equity.

"Legal representative" means executor or administrator.

"Mines and minerals" means mines and minerals whether already opened or in work, or not, and includes all minerals and substances in, on, or under the land, obtainable by underground or by surface working; and the term "mining purposes" includes the sinking and searching for, winning, working, getting, making merchantable, smelting or otherwise converting or working for the purposes of any manufacture, carrying away, and disposing of, mines and minerals, in or under the settled land, or any

other land, and the erection of buildings, and the execution of engineering and other works. suitable for those purposes; and a "mining lease" is a lease for any mining purposes or purposes connected therewith, and includes a grant or license for any mining purposes.

"Rent" includes yearly or other rent, and toll, duty, royalty, or other reservation, by the acre, or the ton, or otherwise; and, in relation to rent, "payment" includes delivery, and "fine" includes premium or fore-gift, and any payment, consideration, or benefit in the nature of a fine, premium, or fore-gift.

"Securities" include stocks, funds, and shares.

"Trustee company" means a company authorised by Act of Parliament to act as trustee in New South Wales.

"Will" includes a codicil, and any other testamentary instrument, and a writing in the nature of a will.

#### Settlement.

5. (1) Any deed, will, agreement for a settlement, Definition of or other agreement, covenant to surrender, Act of Par-settlement. liament, or other instrument, or any number of instru-See 45 & 46 Vic., c. 38, ments, whether made or passed before or after, or partly s. 2. before and partly after, the commencement of this Act. under or by virtue of which instrument or instruments any land stands for the time being limited to or in trust for any persons by way of succession, is a settlement for the purposes of this Act, or creates such a settlement, and is in this Act referred to as a settlement, or as the settlement, as the case may be.

(2) An estate or interest in remainder or reversion Undisposed of not disposed of by a settlement, and reverting to the remainder or reversion. settlor, or descending to the heir of a testator, or passing to his executors or administrators under the law relating to the descent and distribution of the real estate of intestates, is for the purposes of this Act an estate or interest coming to the settlor, heir, executors, or administrators, under or by virtue of the settlement, and comprised in the subject of the settlement.

- (3) Land, which is the subject of a settlement, is Settled land. for the purposes of this Act settled land, and is, in relation to the settlement, referred to in this Act as the settled land.
- (4) Land settled by a settlement shall be deemed for the purpose of this Act to remain and be settled land so long as any charge or power of charging under the settlement subsists or is capable of being exercised; and the trustees of the settlement for the purposes of this Act shall remain and be trustees thereof for those purposes so long as the land is deemed to be settled land as aforesaid.

# Tenant for life.

- **6.** (1) The person who is for the time being, under a Tenant for settlement, beneficially entitled to possession of settled life. land for his life is for the purposes of this Act the tenant 45 & 46 Vic., for life of that land, and the tenant for life under that c. 38, s. 2 (5). settlement.
- (2) If in any case there are two or more persons so entitled as tenants in common, or as joint tenants, or for other concurrent estates or interests, they together constitute the tenant for life for the purposes of this Act.
- (3) A person being tenant for life within the foregoing definitions shall be deemed to be such, not-withstanding that under the settlement or otherwise the settled land, or his estate or interest therein, is incumbered or charged in any manner or to any extent.
- 7. (1) Each person as follows shall, when the estate Enumeration or interest of each of them is in possession, have the limited powers of a tenant for life under this Act, as if each of owners, to them were a tenant for life as defined in this Act, of tenant for namely,—
  - (a) a person entitled to land for an estate in fee see Ibid. simple, or for any leasehold interest with or subject to, in any such case an executory limitation, gift, or disposition over, on failure of his issue, or in any other event;
  - (b) a tenant for years determinable on life, not holding merely under a lease at a rent;

(c) a tenant for the life of another, not holding merely under a lease at a rent;

(d) a tenant for his own or any other life, or for years determinable on life, whose estate is liable to cease in any event during that life, whether by expiration of the estate, or by conditional limitation, or otherwise, or to be defeated by an executory limitation, gift, or disposition over, or is subject to a trust for accumulation of income for payment of debts or other purpose;

(e) a tenant in tail after possibility of issue extinct; (f) a person entitled to the income of land under a

trust (including an implied or constructive trust) or direction for payment thereof to him during his own or any other life, whether subject to expenses of management or to a trust for accumulation of income for any purpose, or not, or until sale of the land, or until cesser or determination by any means of his interest therein on bankruptcy or other event.

(2) In every such case, the provisions of this Act referring to a tenant for life, either as conferring powers on him or otherwise, and to a settlement, and to settled land, shall extend to each of the persons aforesaid, and to the instrument under which his estate or interest

arises, and to the land therein comprised.

(3) In any such case any reference in this Act to death as regards a tenant for life shall, where necessary, be deemed to refer to the determination by death or otherwise of such estate or interest as last aforesaid.

8. Where a person who is in his own right seised of Infant or entitled in possession to land, or beneficially entitled absolutely entitled to be to the whole interest in land, is an infant, then for the as tenant for purposes of this Act the land is settled land, and the life. infant shall be deemed tenant for life thereof:

# Capital money.

11. Capital money arising under this Act, and Capital receivable for the trusts and purposes of the settlement, money. is in this Act referred to as capital money arising under c. 38, s. 2 (9). this Act.

A fine received on the grant of a lease under any 47 & 48 Vic. power conferred by this Act is to be deemed capital c. 18, s. 4. money arising under this Act.

#### PART II.

# POWERS OF TENANT FOR LIFE.

Sale—Exchange—Partition.

12. A tenant for life—

(a) may sell the land, or any part thereof, or any life to sell, &c.

(c) where the settlement comprises an undivided share in land, or the settled land has under the settlement come to be held in undivided shares, may concur in making partition of the entirety, including a partition in consideration of money paid for equality of partition.

13. (1) Every sale shall be made at the best price Regulations that can reasonably be obtained for cash or on such sale, terms as on a sale by a trustee under section, sub-exchange, and partition, of the Trustee Act, 1917.

(2) Every exchange and every partition shall vic., c. 38, be made for the best consideration in land, or in land. 4.

and money that can reasonably be obtained.

(3) A sale may be made in one lot or in several lots, and either by auction or by private contract.

(4) On a sale the tenant for life may fix reserve

biddings and buy in at an auction.

(5) A sale, exchange, or partition may be made subject to any stipulations respecting title, or evidence of title, or other things.

(6) On a sale, exchange, or partition, any restric-

tion or reservation with respect to—

(a) building on or other user of land; or

(b) mines and minerals; or

(c) the more beneficial working of mines and minerals; or

(d) any other thing,

may be imposed or reserved and made binding, as far as the law permits, by covenant, condition, or otherwise, on the tenant for life and the settled land, or any part thereof, or on the other party and any land sold or given in exchange or on partition to him. (7)

(7) Settled land in New South Wales shall not be given in exchange for land out of New South Wales.

14. Where on a sale, exchange, or partition there is Transfer of an incumbrance affecting land sold or given in exchange incumbrances on land or on partition, the tenant for life, with the consent of sold, &c. the incumbrancer, may charge that incumbrance on 45 & 46 Vic., any other part of the settled land, whether already c. 38, s. 5. charged therewith or not, in exoneration of the part sold or so given, and may, by mortgage of the fee-simple, or other estate or interest the subject of the settlement, or any part of the settled land, or by creation of a term of years in the settled land, or any part thereof, or other-

wise, make provision accordingly.

15. Where a sale of settled land is to be made to Provision the tenant for life, or a purchase is to be made from enabling dealings with him of land to be made subject to the limitations of the tenant for settlement, or an exchange is to be made with him of life. settled land for other land, or a partition is to be made c. 69, s. 12. with him of land an undivided share whereof is subject to the limitations of the settlement, the trustees of the settlement shall stand in the place of and represent the tenant for life, and shall, in addition to their powers as trustees, have all the powers of the tenant for life in reference to negotiating and completing the transaction.

#### Leases.

17. A tenant for life may lease the settled land, or power of tenant any part thereof, or any easement, right, or privilege of for ordinary or building or any kind, over or in relation to the same, for any pur-mining pur-mining purpose whatever, whether involving waste or not, for any See 46 to 46 Vic., c. 38, s. 6. term not exceeding-

(a) in case of a building lease, fifty years; (b) in case of a mining lease, sixty years;

(c) in case of any other lease, twenty-one years.

- 18. (1) Every lease shall be by deed, and be made Regulations to take effect in possession not later than twelve months respecting leases after its date.
- (2) Every lease shall reserve the best rent that See 45 & 46 can reasonably be obtained, regard being had to any s. 7. fine taken, and to any money laid out or to be laid out for the benefit of the settled land, and generally to the circumstances of the case.
- (3) Every lease shall contain a condition of reentry on the rent not being paid within a time therein specified not exceeding thirty days, and the covenants implied by section seventy of the Conveyancing and Law of Property Act, 1917, shall not be excluded therefrom.
- (4) A counterpart of every lease shall be executed by the lessee and delivered to the tenant for life; of which execution and delivery the execution of the lease by the tenant for life shall be sufficient evidence.
- (5) A statement contained in a lease or in an indorsement thereon, signed by the tenant for life, respecting any matter of fact or of calculation under this Act in relation to the lease, shall, in favour of the lessee and of those claiming under him, be sufficient evidence of the matter stated.

# Building and mining leases.

- 19. (1) Every building lease shall be made partly Regulations in consideration of the lessee, or some person by whose respecting direction the lease is granted, or some other person, leases. having erected, or agreeing to erect, buildings, new or Ibid. s. 8. additional, or having improved or repaired, or agreeing to improve or repair, buildings, or having executed, or agreeing to execute, on the land leased, an improvement authorised by this Act, for or in connection with building purposes.
- (2) A peppercorn rent or a nominal or other rent less than the rent ultimately payable, may be made payable for the first five years, or any less part of the term.

(3) Where the land is contracted to be leased in lots, the entire amount of rent to be ultimately payable may be apportioned among the lots in any manner; save that-

(a) the annual rent reserved by any lease shall not

be less than ten shillings:

(b) the total amount of the rents reserved on all leases for the time being granted shall not be less than the total amount of the rents which, in order that the leases may be in conformity with this Act, ought to be reserved in respect of the whole land for the time being leased;

(c) the rent reserved by any lease shall not exceed one-fifth part of the full annual value of the land comprised in that lease with the buildings

thereon when completed.

**20.** (1) Any building lease, and any agreement for option of granting building leases, under this Act may contain an purchase in building option, to be exercised at any time within an agreed lease. number of years not exceeding ten, for the lessee to 52 & 53 Vic., purchase the land leased at a price fixed at the time of c. 36, s. 2. the making of the lease or agreement for a lease, such price to be the best which having regard to the rent reserved can reasonably be obtained, and to be either a fixed sum of money or such a sum of money as shall be equal to a stated number of years' purchase of the highest reserved by the lease or agreement.

(2) Such price when received shall for all Price to be capital money: purposes be capital money arising under this Act.

**21.** (1) In a mining lease—

(a) the rent may be made to be ascertainable by or respecting mining leases. to vary according to the acreage worked, or by 45 & 46 Vic., or according to the quantities of any mineral c. 38, s. 9. or substance gotten, made merchantable, converted, carried away, or disposed of, in or from the settled land, or any other land, or by or according to any facilities given in that behalf; and

(b) a fixed or minimum rent may be made payable, with or without power for the lessee, in case the

the rent, according to acreage or quantity, in any specified period does not produce an amount equal to the fixed or minimum rent, to make up the deficiency in any subsequent specified period, free of rent other than the fixed or minimum rent;

(c) (i) the rent may be made to vary according to 52 & 53 Vic., the price of the minerals or substances gotten c. 36, s. 8.

or any of them;

(ii) such price may be the saleable value, or the price or value appearing in any trade or market or other price list or return from time to time, or may be the marketable value as ascertained in any manner prescribed by the lease (including a reference to arbitration), or may be an average of any such prices or values taken during a specified period.

(2) A mining lease may be made partly in consideration of the lessee having executed, or his agreeing to execute, on the land leased, an improvement authorised by this Act, for or in connection with mining

purposes.

22. In the case of a mining lease, whether the Partof mining mines or minerals leased are already opened or in work aside. or not, there shall, unless a contrary intention is ex-45 & 46 Vic., pressed in the settlement, be from time to time set c. 38, s. 11. aside, as capital money arising under this Act, part of the rent as follows, namely,—where the tenant for life is impeachable for waste in respect of minerals, three-fourth parts of the rent, and otherwise one-fourth part thereof, and in every such case the residue of the rent shall go as rents and profits.

23. The leasing power of a tenant for life extends Leasing powers for the making of—

(a) a lease for giving effect to a contract entered objects. into by any of his predecessors in title for *Ibid.* s. 12. making a lease, which, if made by the predecessor, would have been binding on the successors in title;

(b) a lease for giving effect to a covenant of renewal, performance whereof could be enforced against the owner for the time being of the settled land; and (c)

(c) a lease for confirming, as far as may be, a previous lease, being void or voidable; but so that every lease, as and when confirmed, shall be such a lease as might at the date of the original lease have been lawfully granted under this Act, or otherwise as the case may require.

24. (1) Any lease not otherwise authorised by this Power to Act may be made for any term or purpose, and subject grant special leases under to any rent and conditions which the Court may by an order of order, either generally or in any particular instance, the Court.

(2) The tenant for life may in conformity with the order make any lease so approved of the settled land, or part thereof, or of any easement, right, or privilege over or in relation to the same or any part thereof.

#### Surrenders.

25. (1) A tenant for life may accept, with or with-Surrender out consideration, a surrender of any lease of settled and new grant of leases. land whether made under this Act or not, in respect of 45 & 46 Vic... the whole land leased, or any part thereof, with or without c. 38, s. 13. an exception of all or any of the mines and minerals therein, or in respect of mines and minerals, or any of them.

(2) On a surrender of a lease in respect of part only of the land or mines and minerals leased, the rent

may be apportioned.

(3) On a surrender, the tenant for life may make of the land, or mines and minerals surrendered, or of any part thereof, a new or other lease, or new or other leases in lots.

(4) A new or other lease may comprise additional land, or mines and minerals, and may reserve any

apportioned or other rent.

(5) On a surrender, and the making of a new or other lease, whether for the same, or for any extended or other term, and whether or not subject to the same or to any other covenants, provisions, or conditions, the value of the lessee's interest in the lease surrendered may

be taken into account in the determination of the amount of the rent to be reserved, and of any fine to be taken, and of the nature of the covenants, provisions, and conditions to be inserted in the new or other lease.

(6) Every new or other lease shall be in conformity with this Act.

# Streets and open spaces.

26. On or in connexion with a sale for building Dedication of purposes, or a building lease, the tenant for life, for the streets, open spaces, &c. general benefit of the residents on the settled land, or 45 & 46 Vic., any part thereof—

- (a) may cause or require any parts of the settled land to be appropriated and laid out for streets, roads, paths, squares, gardens, or other open spaces, for the use, gratuitously or on payment, of the public or of individuals, with sewers, drains, watercourses, fencing, paving, or other works necessary or proper in connection therewith;
- (b) may provide that the parts so appropriated shall be conveyed to or vested in the trustees of the settlement, or other trustees, or any company or public body, on trusts or subject to provisions for securing the continued appropriation thereof to the purposes aforesaid, and the continued repair or maintenance of streets and other places and works aforesaid, with or without provision for appointment of new trustees when required; and
- (c) may execute any general or other deed necessary or proper for giving effect to the provisions of this section, and thereby declare the mode, terms, and conditions of the appropriation, and the manner in which and the persons by whom the benefit thereof is to be enjoyed, and the nature and extent of the privileges and conveniences granted.

## Surface and minerals apart.

27. (1) A sale, exchange, partition, or mining lease separate may be made either of land, with or without an excep-dealing with tion or reservation of all or any of the mines and minerals minerals, therein, or of any mines and minerals, and in any such with or without waycase with or without a grant or reservation of powers of leaves, &c. working, wayleaves or rights of way, rights of water and 45 & 46 Vic., drainage, and other powers, easements, rights, and privileges for or incident to or connected with mining purposes, in relation to the settled land, or any part thereof, or any other land.

(2) An exchange or partition may be made subject to and in consideration of the reservation of an undivided share in mines or minerals.

## The raising of money.

28. (1) Where money is required—

(a) for equality of exchange or partition, or

(b) for the purpose of discharging an incumbrance discharge of on the settled land or part thereof, the tenant Ibid. s. 18. for life may raise the money so required, and 53 & 54 Vic., also the amount properly required for payment c. 69. s. 11. of the costs of the transaction on mortgage of the fee simple or other estate or interest the subject of the settlement or any part of the settled land, or by creation of a term of years in the settled land, or any part thereof, or otherwise, and the money so raised shall be capital money for that purpose, and may be paid or applied accordingly.

(2) Incumbrance in this section does not include any annual sum payable only during a life or lives, or during a term of years absolute or determinable.

## Undivided share.

29. Where the settled land comprises an undivided Concurrence share in land, or, under the settlement, the settled land in exercise of powers as to has come to be held in undivided shares, the tenant for undivided life of an undivided share may join or concur, in any share.

## Conveyance.

**30.** (1) On a sale, exchange, partition, lease, mort-completion of gage, or charge, the tenant for life may, as regards land sale, lease, sold, given in exchange or on partition, leased, mortgaged, veyance. or charged, or intended so to be, including leasehold See 45 & 46 land vested in trustees, or as regards easements or other s. 20. rights or privileges sold or leased, or intended so to be, convey or create the same by all proper assurances, for the estate or interest the subject of the settlement, or for any less estate or interest, and in the manner requisite for giving effect to the sale, exchange, partition, lease, mortgage, or charge.

(2) Such assurance to the extent and in the manner to and in which it is expressed or intended to operate and can operate under this Act, is effectual to pass the land conveyed, or the easements, rights, or privileges created, discharged from all limitations, powers, and provisions of the settlement, and from all estates, interests, and charges subsisting or to arise thereunder, but subject to and with the exception of—

(a) all estates, interests, and charges having priority to the settlement:

(b) all such other (if any) estates, interests, and charges as have been conveyed or created for securing money actually raised at the date of the assurance; and

(c) all leases and grants at fee-farm rents or otherwise and all grants of easements, rights of common, or other rights or privileges granted or made for value in money or money's worth, or agreed so to be, before the date of the assurance, by the tenant for life, or by any of his predecessors in title, or by any trustees for him or them, under the settlement, or under any statutory power, or being otherwise binding on the successors in title or the tenant for life.

(5)

**31.** Where, on a grant for building purposes by a Power to tenant for life, the land is conveyed in fee simple with reserve a rent or subject to a reservation thereout of a perpetual rent grant in fee or rent charge, the reservation shall operate to create simple. a rent charge in fee simple issuing out of the land Vic., c. 69, conveyed, and having incident thereto all powers and s. 9. remedies for recovery thereof conferred by section

#### Contracts.

**32.** (1) For the purposes and subject to the pro-Power for visions of this Act, a tenant for life—

(a) may contract to make any sale, exchange, contracts.

partition, mortgage, or charge;

(b) may vary or rescind, with or without consideration, the contract, in the like cases and manner in which, if he were absolute owner of the settled land, he might lawfully vary or rescind the same, but so that the contract as varied be in conformity with this Act; and any such consideration, if paid in money, shall be capital money arising under this Act;

(c) may contract to make any lease; and in making the lease may vary the terms, with or without consideration, but so that the lease be in con-

formity with this Act;

(d) may accept a surrender of a contract for a lease, in like manner and on the like terms in and on which he might accept a surrender of a lease; and thereupon may make a new or other contract, or new or other contracts, for or relative to a lease or leases, in like manner and on the like terms in and on which he might make a new or other lease, or new or other leases, where a lease had been granted;

- (2) Every such contract shall be binding on and shall enure for the benefit of the settled land, and shall be enforceable against and by every successor in title for the time being of the tenant for life, and may be carried into effect by any such successor; but so that it may be varied or rescinded by any such successor, in the like case and manner (if any) as if it had been made by himself.
- (3) The Court may, on the application of the tenant for life, or of any successor, or of any person interested in any contract, give directions respecting the enforcing, carrying into effect, varying, or rescinding thereof.
- (4) Any preliminary contract under this Act for or relating to a lease shall not form part of the title or evidence of the title of any person to the lease, or to the benefit thereof.
- **33.** A tenant for life may make any conveyance Power to which is necessary or proper for giving effect to a complete contract entered into by a predecessor in title, and contract. which if made by such predecessor would have been 53 & 54 Vic., valid as against his successors in title.

# Infants, married women, lunatics.

34. Where a tenant for life, or a person having the Tenant for powers of a tenant for life under this Act, is an infant, life infant. or an infant would, if he were of full age, be a tenant c. 38, s. 60. for life, or have the powers of a tenant for life under this Act, the powers of a tenant for life under this Act may be exercised on his behalf by the trustees of the settlement, and if there are none, then by such person and in such manner as the Court, on the application of a testamentary

testamentary or other guardian or next friend of the infant, either generally or in a particular instance, may order.

35. In the application of this Act to married women, Married the following provisions shall have effect: to be affected.

(1) Where a married woman is entitled for her See 45 & 46 separate use, or is entitled under any statute, Vic., c. 38, passed or to be passed, for her separate property, or as a femme sole, then she, without her husband, shall be a tenant for life under this

(2) Where she is entitled otherwise than as aforesaid. then she and her husband together shall have the powers of a tenant for life under this Act.

(3) The provisions of this Act referring to a tenant for life and a settlement and settled land shall extend to the married woman without her husband, or to her and her husband together, as the case may require, and to the instrument under which her estate or interest arises, and the land therein comprised.

(4) The married woman may execute, make, and do all deeds, instruments, and things necessary or proper for giving effect to the provisions of

this section.

(5) A restraint on anticipation in the settlement shall not prevent the exercise by her of any

power under this Act—

(a) Where a married woman is restrained from anticipation in respect of land, which, if she were not so restrained, could be disposed of by her, then she, without her husband, shall have the powers of a tenant for life.

(b) The instrument creating the restraint on anticipation shall be deemed the settlement, or one of the instruments creating the settle-

ment, as the case may require.

**36.** Where a tenant for life, or a person having the Tenant for powers of a tenant for life under this Act, is an insane life, insane. person or an incapable person within the meaning of Ibid., s. 62. the Lunacy Act of 1898, the Master in Lunacy or the committee

committee of his estate, as the case may be, may, in his name and on his behalf, under an order of the Court, exercise the powers of a tenant for life under this Act; and the order may be made on the application of any person interested in the settled land, or of the Master or of the committee of the estate.

#### PART III.

INVESTMENT OR OTHER APPLICATION OF CAPITAL TRUST MONEY—IMPROVEMENTS.

38. Capital money arising under this Act, subject to Capital payment of claims properly payable thereout, and to money underapplication thereof for any special authorised object for investment, which the same was raised, shall, when received, be trustees or invested or otherwise applied wholly in one, or partly in court. one and partly in another or others, of the following See 45 & 46 vic., c. 38, modes, namely:—

(a) In investment on Government securities of the 50 Vic. No. United Kingdom or of the Commonwealth of s. 31. (Queens.), Australia or any of the States thereof or of New Zealand, or on mortgage of unencumbered freehold property in New South Wales, or on other securities on which the trustees of the settlement are by the settlement or by law authorised to invest trust money of the settlement, with power to vary the investment into or for any other such securities.

- (b) In discharge, purchase, or redemption of incumbrances affecting the inheritance of the settled land, or other the whole estate the subject of the settlement.
- (c) In discharge of any charge on the settled land or any part thereof created under section nineteen of the Rural Tenants' Improvements Act, 1916.
- (d) In payment for any improvement authorised by this Act.
- (e) In payment for equality of exchange or partition of settled land.
- (f) In purchase of the reversion or freehold in fee of any part of the settled land, being leasehold land held for years, or life, or years determinable on life.
- (g) In purchase of land in fee-simple, or of lease-hold land held for sixty years or more unexpired at the time of purchase, subject or not to any exception or reservation of or in respect of mines or minerals therein, or of or in respect of rights or powers relative to the working of mines or minerals therein, or in other land.
- (h) In purchase, either in fee-simple, or for a term of forty years or more, of mines and minerals convenient to be held or worked with the settled land, or of any easement, right, or privilege convenient to be held with the settled land for mining or other purposes.
- (i) In payment to any person becoming absolutely entitled or empowered to give an absolute discharge.
- (j) In payment of costs, charges, and expenses of or incidental to the exercise of any of the powers, or the execution of any of the provisions, of this Act.
- (k) In any other mode in which money produced by the exercise of a power of sale in the settlement is applicable thereunder. 39.

39. (1) Capital money arising under this Act shall, Regulations in order to its being invested or applied as aforesaid, be respecting investment. paid either to the trustees of the settlement or into devolution, Court, at the option of the tenant for life, and shall be of securities, invested or applied by the trustees, or under the direction &c. of the Court, as the case may be, accordingly.

- (2) The investment or other application by the trustees shall be made according to the direction of the tenant for life, and in default thereof, according to the discretion of the trustees, but in the last-mentioned case subject to any consent required or direction given by the settlement with respect to the investment or other application by the trustees of trust money of the settlement: and any investment shall be in the names or under the control of the trustees.
- (3) The investment or other application under the direction of the Court shall be made on the application of the tenant for life, or of the trustees.
- (4) Any investment or other application shall not during the life of the tenant for life be altered without his consent.
- (5) Capital money arising under this Act while remaining uninvested or unapplied, and securities on which an investment of any such capital money is made, shall for all purposes of disposition, transmission, and devolution be considered as land, and the same shall be held for and go to the same persons successively, in the same manner and for and on the same estates, interests, and trusts, as the land wherefrom the money arises would, if not disposed of, have been held and have gone under the settlement.
- (6) The income of those securities shall be paid or applied as the income of that land, if not disposed of, would have been payable or applicable under the settlement.
- (7) Those securities may be converted into money, which shall be capital money arising under this
- (8) All or any part of any capital money paid 53 & 54 Vic., into court may, if the Court thinks fit, be at any time c. 69, s. 14. paid out to the trustees of the settlement for the purposes of this Act.

40. Capital money arising under this Act from Investment in settled land in New South Wales shall not be applied in land in New South Wales. the purchase of land out of New South Wales unless 45 & 46 Vic., the settlement expressly authorises such application.

**41.** (1) Land acquired by purchase or in exchange, settlement or on partition, shall be made subject to the settlement of land

in manner directed in this section.

(2) Freehold land shall be conveyed on the exchange, &c. trusts, and subject to the powers and provisions which, under the settlement, or by reason of the exercise of any power of charging therein contained, are subsisting with respect to the settled land, or as near thereto as circumstances permit, but not so as to increase or multiply charges or powers of charging.

(3) Leasehold land shall be conveyed to and vested in the trustees of the settlement on trusts, and, subject to powers and provisions corresponding, as nearly as the law and circumstances permit, with the trusts, powers, and provisions to on and subject to which free-

hold land is to be conveyed as aforesaid.

(4) Land acquired as aforesaid may be made a substituted security for any charge in respect of money actually raised, and remaining unpaid, from which the settled land, or any part thereof, or any undivided share therein, has theretofore been released on the occasion and in order to the completion of a sale, exchange, or partition.

(5) Where a charge does not affect the whole of the settled land, then the land acquired shall not be subjected thereto, unless the land is acquired either by purchase with money arising from sale of land which was before the sale subject to the charge, or by an exchange or partition of land which, or an undivided share wherein, was before the exchange or partition subject to the charge.

(6) On land being so acquired, any person who, by the direction of the tenant for life, so conveys the land as to subject it to any charge, is not concerned to inquire whether or not it is proper that the land should

be subjected to the charge.

(7) The provisions of this section referring to land extend and apply, as far as may be, to mines and minerals, and to easements, rights, and privileges over and in relation to land. *Improvements*

# Improvements with capital trust money.

**42.** Improvements authorised by this Act are the pescription of making or execution on, or in connection with, and for authorised by the benefit of settled land, of any of the following See 45 and 46 works, or of any works for any of the following purposes, and any operation incident to or necessary or proper in vic., c. 69, s. 13. the execution of any of those works, or necessary or proper for carrying into effect any of those purposes, or for securing the full benefit of any of those works or purposes, namely—

(a) drainage, including the straightening, widening, or deepening of drains, streams, and water-

courses; irrigation; warping;

(b) drains, pipes, and machinery for supply and distribution of sewage as manure;

(c) embanking or weiring from a river or lake, or from the sea, or a tidal water;

(d) groynes, sea walls, defences against water;

(e) enclosing, erecting or repairing fences (rabbitproof or otherwise);

(f) reclamation, dry warping;

(g) farm roads, private roads, roads or streets in villages or towns;

(h) clearing, trenching, planting; suckering;

(i) destruction of noxious animals, prickly-pear, briar, or other noxious growths;

(j) cottages for labourers, farm-servants, shearers or shed-hands, station-hands, and artisans, employed on the settled land or not;

(k) dwelling-houses, warehouses, offices, out-build-

ings, and other buildings;

(1) saw-mills and other mills, water-wheels, enginehouses, and kilns, which will increase the value of the settled land for agricultural or pastoral purposes or as woodland or otherwise;

(m) reservoirs, tanks, conduits, watercourses, pipes, wells, artesian bores, ponds, shafts, dams, weirs, sluices, and other works and machinery for supply and distribution of water for agricultural, pastoral, manufacturing, or other purposes, or for domestic or other consumption;

(n) tramways, railways, canals, docks; (o)

(o) jetties, piers, and landing places on rivers, lakes, the sea, or tidal waters, for facilitating transport of persons and of agricultural stock and produce, and of manure and other things required for agricultural purposes, and of minerals, and of things required for mining purposes;

(p) streets, roads, paths, squares, gardens, or other open spaces for the use, gratuitously or on payment, of the public or of individuals, or for dedication to the public, the same being necessary or proper in connection with the conversion

of land into building land;

(q) sewers, drains, watercourses, pipe-making, fencing, paving, brick-making, tile-making, and other works necessary or proper in connection with any of the objects aforesaid;

(r) trial pits for mines, and other preliminary works necessary or proper in connection with

development of mines;

(s) bridges; 53 & 54 Vic.,

(t) making any additions to or alterations in buildings reasonably necessary or proper to enable

the same to be let;

(u) erection of buildings in substitution for buildings taken by a local or other public authority, or for buildings taken under compulsory powers, but so that no more money be expended than the amount received for the buildings taken and the site thereof;

(v) reconstruction, enlargement, or improvement of any of such works, whether executed under the provisions of this Act or already existing;

(w) any improvement or other work required to be [See Vict. done by any Act of Parliament whether on Act, No. 2725, freehold or other tenure under the Crown Lands Acts;

(x) in payment of any money expended and costs [8 Edw. VII, incurred by a landlord under or in pursuance c. 28, s. 20.] of the Rural Tenants' Improvements Act, 1916, in or about the execution of any improvement comprised in Part I or Part II of the First Schedule to that Act.

- 43.   - (b) a certificate to the like effect of a competent engineer, surveyor, builder, or architect nominated by the trustees and approved by the Court, which certificate shall be conclusive as aforesaid; or
  - (c) an order of the Court directing or authorising the trustees to so apply a specified portion of the capital money.
- (3) Where the capital money to be expended is [See 53 & 54 in Court, then the Court may, if it thinks fit, on a Vic., c. 69, s. 15.] report or certificate of a competent engineer, surveyor, builder, or architect, approved by the Court, or on such other evidence as the Court thinks sufficient, make such order and give such directions as it thinks fit for the application of that money, or any part thereof, in or towards payment for the whole or part of any work or operation comprised in the improvement.

# Mortgage or sale for improvements.

44. (1) The Court may, upon the application of the Power of tenant for life, or a person having the powers of a tenant Court to order mortgage or for life under this Act, or the trustees of the settlement, sale for imauthorise the expenditure of a specified sum—

(2) The Court may authorise the money so authorised to be expended, and also the amount properly required for payment of the costs of the transaction to be paid out of any capital money arising under this Act in the hands of trustees or in Court or to be raised by the tenant for life on mortgage or sale of the fee-simple or other estate or interest, the subject of the settlement in the settled land, or any part thereof, or by creation of a term of years in the settled land or otherwise, or to pay or raise such money partly in one or partly and another of the said modes as to the Court seems fit.

(3) When the money required is authorised to be raised by mortgage the Court may give directions how the principal and interest are to be paid, and may require a sinking fund to be provided for, so as to enable any such mortgage to be paid off at any stated period, according to the nature of the object for which the money is required, and in every case the Court shall give such directions as appear necessary and proper, so as to throw upon the respective interests of the persons beneficially interested their proper proportion of the moneys to be expended, and in any case where money is authorised to be expended upon leasehold lands, such direction may include provision for a sinking fund.

(4) The money so raised on mortgage or sale, or by creation of a term of years, shall be capital money for that purpose, and may be paid or applied accordingly.

(5) No purchaser or mortgagee paying or advancing money upon any sale or mortgage authorised by the Court under this section shall be required to see to the application of the purchase money or mortgage money.

(1) The tenant for life, and each of his suc-Obligation on cessors in title having, under the settlement, a limited tenant for estate or interest only in the settled land, shall maintain successors to and repair, at his own expense, every improvement maintain insure, &c. executed under the foregoing provisions of this Act, and Thid. s. 28. where a building or work in its nature insurable against damage by fire is comprised in the improvement, shall insure and keep insured the same, at his own expense, in such amount (if any) as the Court by order in any case prescribes.

(2) The tenant for life, or any of his successors as aforesaid, shall not cut down or knowingly permit to be cut down, except in proper thinning, any trees planted as an improvement under the foregoing provisions of this Act.

- (3) The tenant for life, and each of his successors as aforesaid, shall from time to time, if required by the Court, on or without the suggestion of any person having, under the settlement, any estate or interest in the settled land in possession, remainder, or otherwise, report to the Court the state of every improvement executed underthis Act, and the fact and particulars of fire insurance if any).
- (4) The Court may vary any order made by it under this section, in such manner or to such extent as circumstances appear to require, but not so as to increase the liabilities of the tenant for life, or any of his successors as aforesaid.
- (5) If the tenant for life, or any of his successors as aforesaid, fails in any respect to comply with the requirements

## MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

- (4) This section extends to assignments made or coming into operation before or after and to acts done before or after the commencement of this Act; and in this section "assignment" includes assignment by way of mortgage, and any partial or qualified assignment, and any charge or incumbrance; and "assignee" has a meaning corresponding with that of assignment.

#### PART VII.

SETTLEMENT BY WAY OF TRUST FOR SALE.

79. (1) Any land, or any estate or interest in land, Provision for which under or by virtue of any deed, will, or to sell and reagreement, covenent to surrender, Act of Parliament, investin landor other instrument, or any number of instruments, Ibid., s. 63. whether made or passed before or after, or partly before and partly after, the commencement of this Act, is subject to a trust or direction for sale of land, estate, or interest, and for the application or disposal of the money to arise from the sale, or the income of that money, or the income of the land until sale, or any part of that money or income, for the benefit of any person for his life, or any other limited period, or for the benefit of two or more persons concurrently for any limited period, and whether absolutely, or subject to a trust for accumulation of income for payment of

debts or other purpose, or to any other restriction, shall be deemed to be settled land, and the instrument or instruments under which the trust arises shall be deemed to be a settlement; and the person for the time being beneficially entitled to the income of the land, estate, or interest aforesaid until sale, whether absolutely or subject as aforesaid, shall be deemed to be tenant for life thereof; or if two or more persons are so entitled concurrently, then those persons shall be deemed to constitute together the tenant for life thereof: and the persons (if any) who are for the time being under the settlement trustees for sale of the settled land, or having power of consent to, or approval of, or control over the sale, or if under the settlement there are no such trustees, then the persons (if any) for the time being, who are by the settlement declared to be trustees thereof for the purposes of this Act, are for the purposes of this Act the trustees of the settlement.

(2) In every case the provisions of this Act referring to a tenant for life, and to a settlement, and to settled land, shall extend to the person or persons aforesaid, and to the instument or instruments under which his or their estate or interest arises, and to the land therein comprised, subject and except as in this section

provided, that is to say:—

(a) Any reference in this Act to the predecessors or successors in title of the tenant for life, or to the remaindermen, or reversioners or other persons interested in the settled land, shall be deemed to refer to the persons interested in succession or otherwise in the money to arise from the sale of land, or the income of that money, or the income of the land, until sale (as the case may require).

(b) Capital money arising under this Act from the settled land shall not be applied in the purchase of land unless such application is authorised by the settlement in the case of capital money arising thereunder from sales or other dispositions of the settled land, but may, in addition to any other mode of application authorised

authorised by this Act, be applied in any mode in which capital money arising under the settlement of any such sale or other disposition is applicable thereunder, subject to any consent required or direction given by the settlement with respect to the application of trust money of the settlement.

(c) Capital money arising under this Act from the settled land and the securities in which the same is invested shall not for the purpose of disposition, transmission, or devolution, be considered as land unless the same would, if arising under the settlement from a sale or disposition of the settled land, have been so considered, and the same shall be held in trust for and shall go to the same persons successively in the same manner, and for and on the same estates, interests, and trusts as the same would have gone and been held if arising under the settlement from a sale or disposition of the settled land, and the income of such capital money and securities shall be paid or applied accordingly.

(d) Land of whatever tenure acquired under this Act by purchase, or in exchange, or on partition, shall be conveyed to and vested in the trustees of the settlement, on the trusts, and subject to the powers and provisions which, under the settlement or by reason of the exercise of any power of appointment or charging therein contained, are subsisting with respect to the settled land, or would be so subsisting if the same had not been sold, or as near thereto as circumstances permit, but so as not to increase or multiply charges or powers

of charging.

(f) Any person dealing with the trustees from time to time, or with any other person acting under the trusts or powers of the settlement, is not to be affected by an order under this section, unless and until notice thereof is so recorded as aforesaid.

(g) An application to the Court under this section may be made by the tenant for life, or by the persons or one or more of the persons who together constitute the tenant for life, within the meaning of the last preceeding section but one.

(h) An application to rescind or vary an order, or to make any new or further order under this section may be made also by the trustees of the settlement, or by any person beneficially interested under the settlement.

(i) The person or persons to whom leave is given by an order under this section shall be deemed the proper person or persons to exercise the powers conferred by section seventy-nine of this Act, and shall have and may exercise those powers accordingly.

(j) This section is not to affect any dealing which has taken place before the commencement of this Act under any trust or power to which this section applies.

#### PART VIII.

APPLICATION OF ACT TO LAND HELD UNDER THE REAL PROPERTY ACT, 1900.

83. In the application of this Act to settled land Application held under the provisions of the Real Property Act, of Act to land 1900, the following provisions shall have effect:

(3) Where under this Act any instrument is to be executed by a tenant for life in order to the exercise of any such power or authority, that instrument shall be executed by the registered proprietor or registered proprietors, and such execution shall have the same operation as the execution of such an instrument by a tenant for life is declared to have under this Act.

(4) A registered proprietor or registered proprietors executing a power or authority in accordance with the provisions of this Act upon the written request of the tenant for life, or with the sanction of the Court if, being the tenant or the tenants for life, he is himself or they are themselves the sole trustee or trustees of the settlement, shall not by reason thereof incur any personal liability, to his or their beneficiaries or to any other person, and no such registered proprietors

- shall, for the purpose of executing any such power or authority or complying with any such request, be bound to enter into any personal covenant or contract.
- (5) Where under this Act it is provided that land shall be conveyed to any uses or trusts, that expression shall be taken to mean that the land shall be transferred to trustees, and shall be held by them as trustees upon such uses or
- (6) Where under this Act it is provided that a contract made by a tenant for life shall be binding on the settled land, that expression shall be taken also to mean that the contract shall be binding on the registered proprietor, and that he shall be bound to give effect thereto in the same manner as if he had made it himself, subject, however, to the provisions of this Act.

(8) The term "deed" includes any instrument executed and registered in pursuance of the provisions of the Real Property Act, 1900, and "conveyance" includes any transfer in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act.

84.
